

EGSC Guidance on COVID-19

I HAVE EXPERIENCED ONE OR MORE OF THE FOLLOWING (REGARDLESS OF VACCINE STATUS)	
FEVER OF 100F OR MORE	CHILLS OR SWEATS

I HAVE TESTED POSITIVE FOR COVID-19 (REGARDLESS OF VACCINATION STATUS)

I HAVE NO SYMPTOMS, BUT HAVE BEEN IN CLOSE CONTACT WITH SOMEONE DIAGNOSED WITH COVID-19 OR WHO HAS SYMPTOMS OF COVID-19?

Close contact means that you have been within 6 feet of an infected person **for a cumulative total of 15 minutes or more over a 24-hour period* starting from 2 days before illness onset** (or, for asymptomatic persons, 2 days prior to test specimen collection) until the time the person is isolated.

ARE YOU FULLY VACCINATED?

The Centers for Disease Control (CDC) considers individuals "fully vaccinated":
 - 2 weeks after their second dose in a 2-dose series, such as Pfizer or Moderna vaccines, **or**
 - 2 weeks after a single dose vaccine, such as Johnson & Johnson's Janssen vaccine.

 You may go to campus. Monitor for symptoms and follow guidelines if they develop. We strongly recommend wearing a face covering while indoors.

STAY HOME

- 1) Do not come to campus. If you are on campus, *immediately* go home.
- 2) Complete the EGSC Self-Reporting form found in the yellow header at the top of the EGSC website. The Team will contact you for further guidance.
- 3) Do not return to campus until you receive clearance from the EGSC COVID-19 Response Team.

Students: Contact your healthcare provider or Student Health Services by phone for guidance. Inform your faculty of needed absence

Employees: Contact your healthcare provider by phone for guidance. Inform your supervisor of needed absence

IMPORTANT: A negative test result does not automatically allow you to return to campus. There is a possibility of a "false negative" result if a person tests too early after exposure. For this reason, anyone who must quarantine will likely need to do so for 10 days, despite negative test results. If an asymptomatic person develops symptoms during the 10-day quarantine, the time may be extended to 10 days after symptoms first developed. The COVID-19 Response Team will work with individuals to determine the number of days needed for that person based on uniqueness of the situation.
