

The Library: GALILEO and GIL

Are you information literate? Do you understand terms and concepts like periodical index, full text databases, ebooks, and interlibrary loan? Do you know how to use the Library?

Your college career will be much less stressful and more enjoyable if you learn how to navigate the resources at the East Georgia College Library. Go to the EGC homepage and on the left side click **Library**.

On the Library webpage various links and documents have been listed under 5 categories. The links you will use the most are: Connect to GALILEO and Get the GALILEO Password under **Search for Articles**; Connect to GIL@EGC under **Search for Books**; and Bibliographic Styles, Citation Machine, and EasyBib under **Searching and Citing**.

The website GALILEO provides access to most of the items in the EGC Library. GALILEO stands for **GeorgiA LIbrary LEarning Online**, an initiative of the Board of Regents of the University System of Georgia. It is a World Wide Web-based virtual library that provides access to multiple information resources.

GALILEO'S web address (URL) is <www.galileo.usg.edu>. (The 'usg' stands for University System of Georgia. East Georgia College is a two-year college in the USG). GALILEO has 5 interfaces and the default interface for East Georgia College is **GALILEO ** Scholar ** (Higher Education)**.

In the upper left of the GALILEO Scholar interface are 5 search options (white/gold). The default is

Browse by Subject This option allows you to select a subject category and



then a more specific category to search appropriate databases.

Links to the other 4 views/interfaces are at the bottom of the screen.

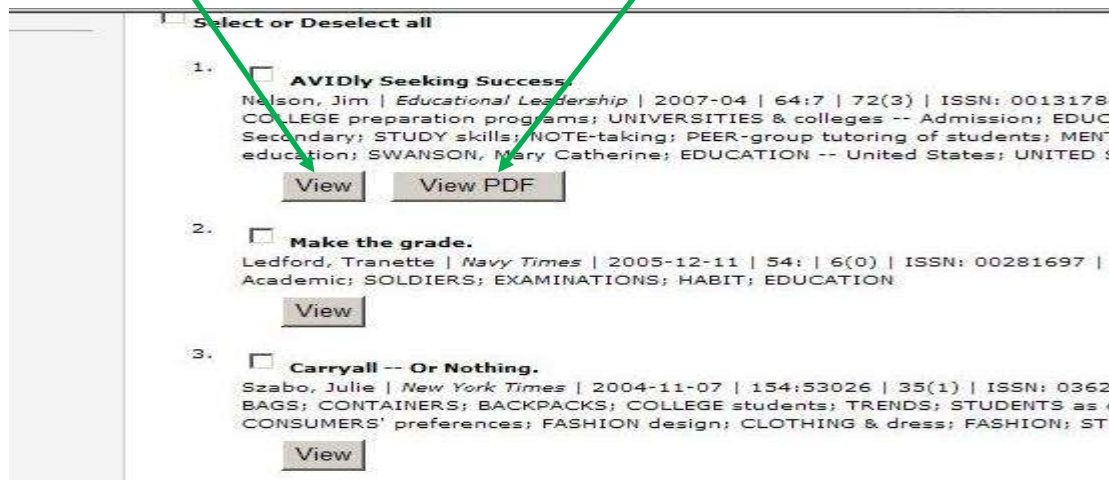

Below the search terms are the **** Databases **** in the same order as listed on the left.

Each **hit** has a [View](#) link and those which are full text *usually* have a [View PDF](#) link. (Database vendors (owners) don't always use the same protocols for indexing, coding, and tagging their holdings, so occasionally a database will have only [View](#) links even though all hits are full-text). When a database has [View](#) and [View PDF](#) links then you know that [View](#) is only the citation and abstract.



Remember, [Browse by Subject](#) allows you to select [Articles & Databases](#) and search databases individually or to select [Subject Search](#) and search more than one database at the time. (The link [Databases A-Z](#) also allows you to select specific databases to search). There are over 200 GALILEO databases which are owned or produced by about 15 vendors. All the databases owned by a certain vendor have the same search screen.

Most of the databases on GALILEO are periodical indexes. Periodicals are magazines, journals, and newspapers, so when you search a periodical index, the results are citations to articles in periodicals. Some citations have the full-text of the article attached for you to read and print.

Other databases are the online version of reference books, such as the *Encyclopedia Britannica* or *The Grove Dictionary of Art*.

Now that we've searched periodical databases, let's learn how to search for books. Return to the GALILEO homepage (click the link at the upper left displaying [GALILEO](#) and the [half-globe](#) icon).



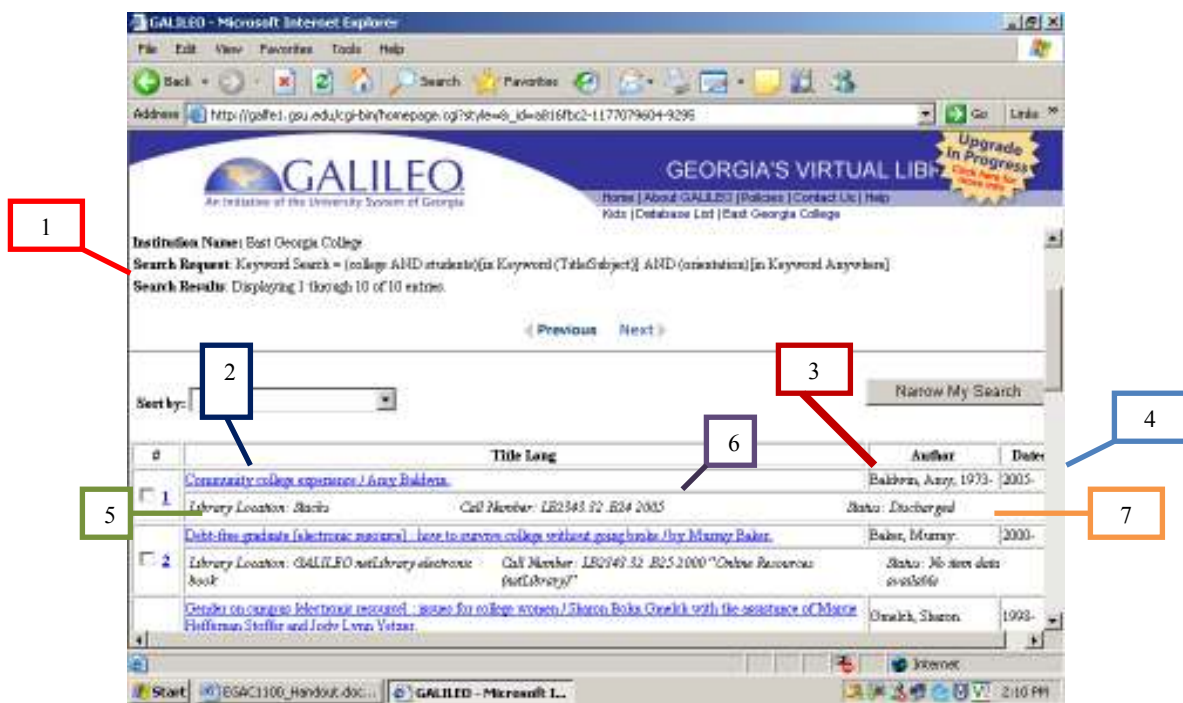
[GIL@EGC](#) is the link to the online college catalog. GIL stands for **GALILEO Interconnected Libraries**.

You can access GIL in two ways: Looking at the screen shot on page 1...(1) from the Library webpage, under **Search for Books**; Looking at the screen shot on page 2...(2) from the GALILEO website, on the right below **About East Georgia College**. GIL provides three search options (see below): You can search for specific authors and titles by doing an **"Exact Search,"** you can search for books about various topics using a **"Keyword Search,"** and you can use **"GIL Quick Search,"** which is not as specific.



After entering search terms in Exact, Keyword, or Quick search you will receive the following screen. The results displayed are:

- (1) Search terms,
- (2) Title,
- (3) Author (if there is a main author/editor),
- (4) Date of publication,
- (5) Location of the title
- (6) Call number, and
- (7) Availability of title (for example, Charged, Discharged, Overdue).



If you cannot locate a useful title in the EGC catalog, you may select the “[GIL Universal Catalog](#)” link at the top of the screen which allows you to search for titles located in the Universal Catalog. The universal catalog consists of all the holdings in the libraries of the USG which is over 10 million volumes and 4.5 million titles.

[GIL@EGC](#) also provides access to your GIL account. Notice the purple/blue box on the bottom-right of the screen.

The link “Access my GIL Account to” allows all students, faculty, and staff at any institution in the USG to...

- “Get GALILEO password”: The EGC password allows you to access and use the databases on GALILEO from off-campus. Simply follow the prompts;
- “Renew books online”: This feature allows you to renew titles that you checked out at the circulation desk in your home (EGC) Library. This includes items requested from another USG Library;
- “Check my requests”: This feature allows you to see if the item you have requested from another library through GIL Express has arrived.

The best way to become familiar with GIL@EGC is to log on and search for items. You may not need to check out any books now, but at least you will learn how to search the college catalog and understand the results that appear on the screen.
